They call him Don Alex

In the Honduran province of Olancho, when Alex Guerrero and his wife Adilia gave birth to their fourth child César, something was terribly wrong. The doctor told Alex that his son was born with deformities, a cleft lip and cleft palate – his advice was to avoid letting people see the baby as it would be traumatic.

"I felt my world falling apart," said Alex. The doctors only told them the problem could be solved by surgery, but had no information on where to go.

"It was very difficult feeding Cesar, his glucose levels got very low, we just could not feed him. He lost mobility, yet no one could tell us what to do," says Alex, his eyes welling up with tears from the memory. For eight months, Alex and Adilia desperately searched for help. One Honduran clinic asked for 280,000 lempiras (£11,000) for the

cleft lip and cleft palate surgeries – money they didn't have.

One doctor mentioned Operation Smile, but told him they might be charged for surgery. Alex and his wife decided to try Operation Smile as a last resort. "As I went through the gates to the Operation Smile centre in Tegucigalpa, It was like seeing light at the end of a tunnel,

staff were kind and respectful."

César received surgery a few weeks later — it didn't cost a single lempira. "At that moment, I made a promise, that there will not be one single person in Olancho, living with an untreated cleft lip or cleft palate. I don't want anybody to go through what we have."

Alex and his family now spend all their time helping others receive care they desperately need. Everyone he meets calls him Don Alex, conveying their respect for him and his dedication.

In his role as assistant to the Health Minister of the region, Alex has provided all 230 health clinics with information about Operation Smile. He makes radio announcements and television appearances to reach every corner of Olancho – an area of Honduras home to more than 700,000 people. Alex visits families, bringing César to show them there is hope.

The majority of people Alex helps live in extreme poverty. Many earn £2 daily, only eating one meal a day. They do not have the money to pay for the bus to the closest clinic, let alone a bus to the closest hospital in a distant city.

Alex has enabled numerous families to receive the help they need and he encourages others to spread the word about how Operation Smile helps children with cleft conditions.

Inspired by his work, seven parents of former Operation Smile patients became the first patient advocates for a new 'Accompaniment Progamme'. Working as a link between our centre in Tegucigalpa and their communities – they share information, facilitate transportation and give instructions for follow up.

"If I could look into the future, I see zero people suffering from cleft lip or cleft palate in the whole country," he says. "That is our mission and I am confident we can fulfil it."

Focus on Malawi

When a child is born with a cleft condition in Malawi, it is a matter of life and death. Many parents do not know where to get help — they do not know how to breastfeed or take care of their child with a cleft condition. They are forced to choose which of their children gets food; which child gets to grow stronger and go to school: which child gets to survive.

Those who do survive may suffer difficulty eating or speaking and are vulnerable to negative attitudes. marginalisation and social stigma. This almost always prevents children from attending school or envisioning an independent future when their fundamental rights such as education and health are compromised. The issues associated with poverty in Malawi, including malnutrition, lack of education and limited access to healthcare, are exacerbated and compounded for children living with a cleft condition.

Malawi is one of Operation Smile's newest countries of activity. The first medical mission was held in the country in 2012 and since then we have held 7 missions, screened 1,570 patients and provided surgery for 984 children and adults living with a cleft condition. We estimate that globally there are likely 500,000 people living with an unrepaired cleft lip and/or palate. In Malawi alone, we estimate that there are more than 2,400 people with an unrepaired cleft condition.

Malawi has a critical shortage of medical professionals and as such, is unable to provide these cleft patients with the surgery and care they need. The country has a population of more than 17 million that is served by only 61 surgeons, 11 anaesthetists, and 7 obstetricians.

Operation Smile is working to build knowledge and skills within the medical profession, to grow Malawi's capacity to take care of children with cleft conditions.

Last Autumn I joined the team travelling to Malawi for my very first mission with Operation Smile. Nothing could prepare me for when I first saw patients arriving at the hospital. I felt a mixture of sympathy and shock at the continuous flow of people arriving for registration. I saw a lot of tired patients and underweight children. I joined some adults who were alone, recognising

this would be daunting for them.

It was amazing to witness surgeries performed by our surgical teams. I broke down into tears upon seeing a 6 month old baby receiving surgery, I watched in amazement as the surgeon meticulously reconstructed the baby's lip and nose in just two hours. Surgical teams from Malawi, Ghana, Kenya, South Africa, US and UK worked all day, into the night through power cuts to complete 125 surgeries in 4 days!

A local school was used as accommodation for patients and families. Here we held feeding and speech development workshops which were well attended and appreciated. The aim was to educate parents to become teachers for their communities.

I feel extremely proud to be part of the Operation Smile team and to witness how trusted we are as we provide safe reconstructive surgery for cleft lip and cleft palate conditions.

Our supporters may remember that Nowell who featured in our **Autumn Appeal last year with** his twin brother, was too sick to receive surgery on the last mission in Zomba, Malawi. He was given antibiotics, and his mother was assured that as long as he was healthy enough he would receive surgery on the next mission.

We were all so overjoyed to hear from Sarah that Nowell had received surgery and he could now join his twin brother Noah with his new smile and share hopes for a brighter future!

Greth Liseth and her children live in an impoverished area of Olancho, Honduras. Greth was devastated when her son, Erick Manuel, was born. She had never seen a cleft lip or cleft palate before; nobody could explain why her Manuelito was born that way. She couldn't breastfeed him and felt helpless.

Greth wakes up at 5 a.m. every morning to prepare breakfast for her children before they go to school. She then goes to work as a cook. Her oldest daughter, 14 years old, stays home to take care of Manuelito. Greth only earns 1,000 lempiras (£40) each month, it is never enough even to buy groceries, she borrows money to survive.

When Manuelito was born, she felt overwhelmingly desperate and lonely. Superstitious people blamed her for Manuelito's condition, saying she had watched too many lunar eclipses. One woman told her that her son was a monster and his deformities were her fault. "Doctors said not to worry as they know a person that could help," Greth said. "His name is Don Alex Guerrero,

they gave me his number."

Greth's family is one of the families that Don Alex and his team promised to support. "I called Don Alex from the hospital

and he came and found me straight away" Greth said. "I didn't know how to feed my son. Don Alex told me to stay there. He left and came back with formula, drove me home and taught me how to feed my son."

Don Alex also invited her to his house to meet his son César, explaining that he too was born with the same condition. "I was so happy when I met his child because he looks normal. I know that with the will of God, my son is going to be beautiful and healthy."

Greth arrived to the Operation Smile medical mission in Tegucigalpa's Hospital San Felipe with the hope that her son would receive surgery. Don Alex brought her and 18 other children and family members there.

The staff at the centre provided Greth with instructions and formula that her son needed to gain weight for the surgery.

Greth could have neither afforded the bus ride to the city, nor would she have dared to go there alone without the help of Don Alex. Without him, she would not have found Operation Smile Honduras and Manuelito would not have received one of the 150 surgeries performed during the medical mission. Greth feels confident about her son's future.

"He is going to be a beautiful boy," she said. "I want to thank Operation Smile, because if it wasn't for them, my child wouldn't be able to have surgery, now everything is going to be fine and I want to thank the staff and Don Alex for all their support."

2017 was a remarkable year for Operation Smile – not only have we celebrated 35 years, but we were also able to announce the eradication of the backlog of cleft conditions in Honduras.

Along with the Honduran Ministry

of Health, we have managed to find and to heal all those who were living with an unrepaired cleft condition. Alongside this, through our capacity building efforts, we have been able to upskill the health workers in the country so that they are now able to take care of the new birth rate themselves. It is a remarkable achievement that Operation Smile are now replicating in neighbouring Guatemala. Both countries face similar issues surrounding poverty and lack of access to

healthcare; however we will
use the 20 years of experience
that we gained in Honduras, to
effectively reach all those waiting
for surgery in Guatemala as well.
One of the largest challenges

that we face is finding those who need our help. It was our unique utilisation of patient advocates like Don Alex in Honduras that enabled us to undertake this enormous task. In one district alone, our patient advocate located 47 patients who had been hidden from our traditional patient recruitment techniques. We saw that through the use of patient advocates, the average age of patients coming forward to our missions was higher, whilst the spectrum of oldest and youngest patients also increased. These factors indicate a greater reach within the community.

To have eradicated cleft in Honduras was a proud moment for Operation Smile, but we know that there are hundreds of thousands of people around the world who are without surgical care. Using our 35 years of experience, and learnings from countries such as Honduras, we are more determined than ever to achieve our ambition to find and treat all those who need our help.
